### **Cad/Drafting/Design Competition**

Janet Pardee, P.E., Balzhiser & Hubbard Engineers, was our committee chair this year for NAWIC's "Cad/Drafting/Design Competition". Janet has been the chair for many years and we would like to thank her for all her hard work in putting this contest together and also Balzhiser & Hubbard Engineers for all their support.

This competition is administered by the NAWIC Education Foundation in an effort to create an awareness of job opportunities in the Construction Industry. It provides recognition to students for their creative design, successful problem solving, and craftsmanship in preparing architectural drawings and renderings. The entries were evaluated for detail, accuracy and originality of work. Contestants were judged at the local level and the winners entries were then submitted to the Regional Competition and then on to the National Competition.

Students were furnished with an Architectural Problem designed by a licensed Architect, a site description and plan, and a listing of drawings required. Judging was performed by construction industry professionals.

## Recap of last month's meeting

Our April speaker was Larry Fipps from OR-OSHA Eugene Office. Larry splits up his time, half as a consultant and the other half as a trainer. He also explained the difference between a consultant and a compliance officer. A consultant comes out to your work site invited and reports on what you could be cited for. Then you have 30 days to make the corrections. They cannot share the information with anyone on where they have been or what they have seen. They are there to help you and answer your questions. Compliance officers can give citations for every violation they find, especially the new officers who have not had as much experience. The officers that have been around for a while are more likely to give out citations for the hazardous violations only.

Larry talked about the top 10 citations in the construction industry. They are failure to follow the:

- 1 – General fall protection requirements
- 2 – Written certification of fall protection training
- 3 – Fall protection requirements for floors, balconies
- 4 – Fall protections requirements for wall openings
- 5 – Portable ladder 3" above surface
- 7 – Trenches shored
- 8 – Training on safe operation of equipment
- 9 – Fall protection training program required
- 10- Protective helmets

As you can see it's mostly for fall protection and not having proper training. Larry also talked about the top 10 citations for all industries. As with the construction industry the top one was fall protection and having fall protection training. Two on the list were regarding having a safety committee and meeting minutes and also having a written hazard communication program and written hazard assessment. You must have a written hazard communication program. Larry said that most companies have the MSDA sheets, but you also have to have a written program. Every 3 years you also have to document your PP&E. As for the Safety Committee if you have 11 plus employees you must have an effective safety committee. The committee has to have 4 members if there are more than 20 employees, otherwise you only have to have 2 and you must have meeting minutes. Portable fire extinguishers have to be checked monthly to see if the gage is in green zone, pin is in and there is a hose. Tag attached to the fire extinguisher must be checked off monthly.

Larry discussed how companies are selected to be put on the "500 Company List" for OSHA inspections. They are the ones with the most citations, hazards, and accidents. If there is a death involved OSHA must investigate within 8 hrs. and injuries are within 24 hrs. Complaints will not get you on the list. Most citations given for accidents are for lack of training and/or lack of supervision.

Larry was very informative and did a great job. There are lots of free training classes at the OSHA office here in Eugene. Nawic includes this list in our newsletter and on the website. He also distributed a CD with all kinds of information on it including forms you can use and a handout. If you would like a copy of either one or both please let me know.

### Recap of last month's Featured Member

Our featured member at our April meeting was Sharon Anderson. She works for Gary Pierce Painting. Sharon was born in San Mateo, California. She moved to Oregon in 1977, the day after graduating from high school. Her first Oregon experience was the Oregon County Fair. She said it was a very interesting and eye opening first experience!

Sharon studied accounting at LCC for 2 years and then went into banking for 12 years. She then got a job at Vaughn & Pierce Painting, which is now Gary Pierce Painting. She has worked there for 19 years.

Gary Pierce Painting does 95% commercial work and about 5% residential in addition also install wall coverings. They work with all the general contractors in our local area. Their shop also has a spray booth which is normally used in conjunction with finish work on commercial projects. They do not advertise this but they can refinish or paint cabinetry or trim as schedule allows. Her company uses Rodda Paint, Sherwin Williams, ICI, Benjamin Moore and Miller Paint products.

Her tips for painting: Good quality paint brushes allow you to paint a straight line. Place brush on surface, apply slight pressure, go slow and even...it takes a little practice but is worth it as you cut back on masking surfaces. When using a brush, dip in paint only 1 – 2 inches deep, tap against side of bucket to remove excess and try not to get paint up to the handle. Painters wash brushes in water only; they put brush upside down under faucet, and then fold over gently. You can take a wire brush (just like BBQ brush) and run it through bristles just like combing you hair, then rinse again, flick your wrist while holding brush to remove water, reshape bristles and put back in cardboard holder. Another tip: Paint stores are able to take leftover paint and put in a spray can or they have a Pre-Val Spray Guns available to purchase, which is equivalent to a baby food jar with a small sprayer attached for touch up and repairs. Small artist brushes are also good to use for small nicks at home.

Sharon has lots of hobbies including flower arranging, gardening, hiking, jogging, snowmobiling, riding ATV's, skiing, reading and she loves antiques. She is a wonderful decorator. She splits her time between Springfield & Crescent Lake. Her weekends are spent with her husband and 2 dogs at her home in Crescent Lake.

Sharon has been a member of our chapter for 13 years and she been an officer and board member many times, including President. We enjoy having her in our chapter and thank her and Gary Pierce Painting for all their generous support of our chapter all these years.

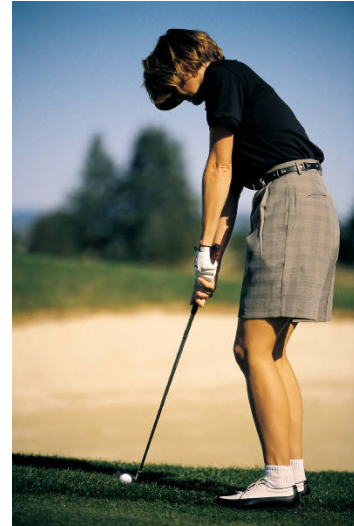

# REGION 9 NEWS

## Regional Forum April 17 & 18, 2009

Friday morning started with Attorney Eileen McKillop with Oles Morrison Attorney. Her specialty is working for Contractors and arguing cases at the Oregon Supreme Court for Washington laws that are outdated, or not well written by the Legislature. She spoke of problems that the sub-contractor could have with the new wrap around insurance, that may have too low of coverage, to be covered they would need to purchase \$50 million coverage. She was a great speaker and will be coming to Oregon soon.

The next speaker from the University of Washington spoke about the new B.I.M. Fully integrated and automated project process. The process involves 3 dimensional Modeling, 4 D and 5D for based estimating. The findings are this type of modeling reduces the cost of change orders, and reduces 75% in total rework. It is based that there is a centralized place for information per building to be drawn from.

Another speaker spoke of the green build and the different ratings, which are a great marketing tool for selling homes. They consist of Leed, 3<sup>rd</sup> Party Verified, Energy Efficient, Energy Star, EPA Indoor Air-Plus Program and EPA Water Sense Homes.

She stated a successful green company, develops a resource network, focuses on what matters to the client, tell your green story, and never stop learning.

The day was packed with information; the next speaker was on Safety. Her recommendations for a safe work environment were to put safety ahead of productivity, make employee accountable with consequences enforced. Don't wait until terrible accident. Document, document and document, ladder inspection, topic of safety policy meetings with topic at top of the date and signature from employee. Lead by example; wear your safety glasses, ear protection etc.

The speaker on Saturday was our own Cathy Brady from Tri-Cities. She spoke on leadership qualities. She had taken the classes that are offered through NAWIC. She spent a week at the academy and learned a lot.

We broke into groups and I was with the group that is reading from Good to Great by Jim Collins that researched how the Great Companies became what they are. It was ten years of research and a lot of interesting information. These companies were Abbott, Circuit City, Fannie Mae, Gillette, Kimberly-Clark, Kroger, Nucor, Philip Morris, Pitney Bowes, Walgreen's, Wells Fargo. Out of these two have gone out of business, or been severely effected. We can learn from that also. I still have more to read but we had a great discussion led by Cathy Hall with Tacoma Chapter, and Fil Spiegel with Alaska. They did a wonderful job facilitating the discussion.

Thank You Chapter for sending me to a wonderful and learning event.

## 2009 Forum Report - Nancy Ograin

Region 9 Annual Forum was packed with a lot of information and many seminars. We all had a good time and were kept busy the whole time. We did get a chance to walk around Seattle and visit Pike's Place Market which was a lot of fun.

One of the seminars "So You Want to be a Leader" was presented by Cathy Bradey, Tri-Cities Chapter #192. She talked about what a leader is and the difference between a manager and a leader. A manager is controlled and structured and a leader unstructured and a visionary.

Some of the qualities found in a leader are:

- Willingness to take ownership of something greater than yourself
- Positive outlook
- Responsible for the welfare of the group
- Encourages everyone's evolution

Leaders work together as a team and they understand the big picture. They also set goals that challenge, but are not overwhelming. Leaders know how to delegate and they think about the success of the group. They take risks and make waves. Leaders have power, but use it wisely and have the ability to get things done.

There are 3 types of power - authority, relationships, knowledge.

- Relationships - A good leader does not need to remind the team who is in charge. They are accessible and keep relationships positive and acknowledge the team members often. A leader also continues to build relationships.
- Knowledge - A good leader does their homework. They have a mentor and they are also a mentor. Leaders are great simplifiers.

Image is also important. Do you dress for success? Remember business casual for men may not work for women. Have a firm, friendly handshake and eye contact. Also, be sure to keep your facial expressions consistent with your message. Leaders are watched and emulated and they think about what they are going to say before they say it. Remember one inappropriate act can last a lifetime.

Cathy summarized leaders as having objectives that are clear and obtainable and engage the team in common goals. They admit to their mistakes and know the difference between failure and learning. And most of all they have FUN!

# DUTIES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors consists of four Directors and the current Officers, including Immediate past President. The board supervises and controls the affairs of the Chapter and presents its recommendation to the general membership at the regular Chapter meetings.

**President** – Presides over all the meetings and serves as Chairman of the Board of Directors. She shall call regular monthly meetings and special meetings as may be necessary. She shall not be a member of the Nominating Committee.

**Vice-President** – Performs the duties of the President in her absence and succeeds as President if that office should become vacant.

**Recording Secretary** – Is responsible for all permanent records of the chapter including minutes of the general meeting and the Board of Directors. She keeps records of the current membership roster and performs other duties as may be requested by the President or Board of Directors.

**Corresponding Secretary** – Is responsible for all the correspondence of the Chapter and sending to the NAWIC Executive Office the chapter delegate and the alternates for Annual Convention.

**Treasurer** – Is the custodian of all chapter funds and is one of the three officers authorized to countersign all checks. She pays bills authorized the Board of Directors and keeps an itemized account of receipt and disbursements while presenting a written report at the regular meeting and the Board of Directors. She must also deliver within 30 days audited records to her successor following the expiration of her term. She is to prepare and file all appropriate forms to the internal revenue service.

## **Board of Directors –**

- a. Exercise general supervision and control over the business of the Chapter.
- b. Authorize payment of any indebtedness incurred on approved budget items.
- c. Adopt the annual budget of the Chapter.
- d. Fill by ballot any vacancies occurring on the Board of Directors with the exception of the President.
- e. Be authorized to create special committees.
- f. Shall present recommendations for action at regular Chapter meetings.
- g. Transact all other business of the Chapter not otherwise provided for.
